# WELLBEING

As we approach the school holidays, we'd like to take a moment to reflect on the successful term we've had at school. Our Wellbeing team has worked hard to support students in their return to school, helping them engage with both new and old friends. Programs such as our Breakfast Club on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday mornings from 8:10-8:40 have been a huge success, providing many students across the whole school the opportunity to start their day on a positive note. Similarly, our Hideout Café during break times continues to be a popular spot, with students eagerly lining up almost every Thursday.

Looking ahead to Term 2, we're excited to offer a range of programs, incursions, and excursions that will cater to all areas of the school. We are confident it will be another successful term!

With the school holidays coming up, it's a great opportunity for families to spend quality time together. At the same time, it's important to be mindful of how much time children spend on devices. Below are some key tips taken from the eSafety Commission that will help guide your family in ensuring a safe and positive online experience.

#### 1. Be Engaged, Open, and Supportive

Get involved with your child's online activities as a family. Play games together and talk about their favourite apps, games, or websites.

Keep communication open. Ask about their online experiences, who they are talking to, and whether they are facing any challenges online.

Reassure your child that they can always come to you, no matter what. Let them know that you won't cut off internet or device access if they share concerns about feeling uncomfortable or unsafe online.

If you notice any changes in your child's behaviour or mood, have a conversation with them. If you're concerned, consider seeking professional help from your GP, a psychologist, or a school counsellor.

#### 2. Set Some Rules

Establish rules for devices and online access, along with consequences for breaking them. As your child grows in online skills, it's important to review and adjust these rules together.

Involve your child in setting the rules so they can better understand the risks involved.

Model good behaviour. Children are more likely to follow the rules if they see you practicing them as well.

Consider creating a family tech agreement. This is a set of guidelines for how devices are used in your home and what acceptable online behaviour looks like. The eSafety Commission provides downloadable templates for families with children of various ages. For families with older children, the Family Online Safety Contract from ThinkUKnow Australia is a great resource.


#### 3. Use Safety Features and Settings

• Learn about the devices your child uses and set them up for privacy and online safety. Take advantage of parental controls to manage screen time and restrict access to content based on your child's age and maturity.

- Choose apps and games carefully. Always check age ratings and reviews on the App Store or Google Play.
- If you're concerned about screen time or online gaming, refer to the eSafety Guide for valuable information on how to keep your child safe.
- The Australian Classification Board and other trusted sources like Children and Media Australia and Common Sense Media (US) offer helpful databases with information about movies, apps, games, and websites, searchable by age.

We encourage all families to review these tips and consider how they can help their child safely navigate the online world. By maintaining an open and supportive environment, we can ensure that our students have a healthy balance of screen time and offline activities during the holidays.

# **3 YEAR OLD KINDER**


(Duck, Fish & Yabby group)

It has been wonderful seeing the children engage and interact with one another in the Kinder environment. We have been developing a family photo shelf that is used as both a comfort and discussion point. Children have been showing their peers and teachers their own families and using language to express and label people and events from the photos.

The three year old classes are exploring community in many ways through discussions, visual learning and play based learning experiences. Through these experiences we are supporting and encouraging children in developing cultural competence. Each group has engaged in activities that focus on different events such as Harmony day, Easter and Ramadan.

By expanding children's knowledge of worldwide traditions, through expose to multicultural information, we are demonstrating we honour differences and children have the opportunity to share in their own personal identity.

One of the routines we are currently working on at Kindergarten is packing away our toys. Using puppets is a powerful learning tool that can bring learning to life. Our pack up puppet supports transition with predictability, visual learning and verbal communication to initiate and explore social learning skills. The puppet provides enjoyment and happiness to key changes to our day encouraging self help skills, working together and responsible and respectful choices. There is a buzz or excitement in the room when he cracks out of his shell.





# **4 YEAR OLD KINDER**

(Turtle, Snake & Frog Group)

This term the four years old kinder children participated in Responsible Pet Incursion. Through participating in this incursion, the children learned strategies on how to be safe around pets, particularly around dogs. The children learned how to safely meet and greet a dog, some children patted the dog, where everyone else participated in the meet and greet with the dog. This was done under teachers' supervision. Children learned about responsible pet care in a fun and engaging way. The program involved storytelling, songs and Dancing.

The children at Creekside Kinder are celebrating Easter as part of our ongoing efforts to promote community involvement. Each year, we organize events that help children feel connected to the community, while also providing opportunities for educators to engage with families. These events foster discussions about cultural celebrations and the importance of community participation. As part of our multicultural community, we embrace the celebration of various cultural holidays, such as Harmony Day, Diwali, Ramadan, Eid, Christmas, and more. In preparation for Easter, the children take part in several open-ended fun activities, they participate in easter egg hunt, where the children will be collecting tokens and receiving chocolates from the kinder. Additionally, we will have a special visit from the Easter Bunny. The children will meet the bunny and take photos with the bunny to make their experience even more memorable.

As the children are adapting into the kinder environment, they are getting familiar with their surroundings and routines while also forming new friendships. The children are exploring the learning spaces and forming connections with both their peers and teachers. At Creekside Kinder, we prioritize the unique needs of each child, offering support for their learning and encouraging active participation in the program. This will help foster children's sense of belonging within the kinder community.



## PREP


In Reading, we have consolidated the first three units of the Sounds Write Program. Students have learnt the initial sounds that s, a, m, i, t, n, o, p, b, c, g, h make. We have covered all our Term 1 high frequency words and are learning to blend the sounds we know to read cvc (consonant, vowel, consonant) words. We have continued our focus on making connections when reading to support their understanding and ability to connect texts to their own experiences. Thank you for your continued support of your child's home reading - your input and time is evident in the wonderful growth they are demonstrating.


In Writing, we are using our sound knowledge to write words in sentences. To support our understanding of a new word we participate in a language experience. The language experience helps us to articulate a sentence and builds on our vocabulary. The words we have learnt so far are: pot, bag, cat and dog. We have also been practising some of our high frequency words to include in our sentences. We are beginning to use capital letters, finger spaces, full stops and ask ourselves 'can I read my writing?'

In Maths, we have been focussing on the concept of teen numbers; teen numbers are a ten and some more. For example 14 is made up of ten and 4 more. We have been using different materials such as ten frames, counters and Rekenreks to support our learning of teen numbers. Students are learning to make the number and match the numeral to the collection. They have continued their focus on writing each number correctly.

In Health, students have been learning about personal strengths. This has included things they are physically good at (soccer, dancing etc) as well as character strengths (being kind, helpful etc). Students have also been learning about feelings and emotions, and are now able to identify how expressing these emotions can look different from one person to another.

It has been a wonderful first term of learning in Prep. We are excited for what Term 2 has in store for us!









We have been having so much fun in Year 1 this term! Here is a look at some of the exciting things we've been doing!

In Reading we have been exploring different types of non fiction texts and using the comprehension strategy of 'questioning' to help us think a little deeper about a text before, during and after reading it. We read books about different animals, insects, weather events as well as procedural texts about how to make or do things.

In writing, we had the exciting opportunity to create our very own procedural texts! After engaging in handson activities, we wrote detailed procedures explaining each step. One of the highlights was making smiley face cookies! We carefully listed all of the materials needed and wrote clear, sequenced steps to describe how to make it. We also completed procedures on how to make a paper bag kite, how to buy a Zooper Dooper and how to make chocolate truffles.

In Maths, we learnt about 2D shapes, with a special focus on quadrilaterals. We explored different types of quadrilaterals and learnt that they are closed shapes with four sides and four corners. One of the most exciting activities we did in this unit was creating a shape robot! We used various quadrilateral shapes to design and build our own unique robots.

In Humanities, we started the term learning about families and discussed the important people in our lives. We learnt about family members and what it means to be part of a family. We also explored the difference between immediate family (those who live with us) and extended family (those who may live elsewhere but are still connected to us).

Next, we learnt about the difference between the past, present and future. To help us understand this topic a little better, we took part in a special toy incursion, where we had the chance to see, touch, hear and play with toys from the past. This hands-on experience allowed us to compare historical toys with modern versions, as well as develop our understanding of how innovation and materials have transformed the way we play.









Term 1 has been one to remember for the amazing year two cohort as we have continued to show some amazing learning across our maths, reading and writing lessons.


In Maths, we have been learning about regular and irregular shapes. Students learnt about how we can name a shape depending on how many sides and corners it has. We also learnt how to identify and draw irregular shapes based on the amount of sides it has.

We have also been learning about renaming whole numbers which means that students learn how to show a number in different ways using different materials.

In Reading, we have been focusing on summarising using the story champs icons to help them decide what is the important information that they should include in a summary. Many students are also starting to use time connectives in their summary such as, first, then, next, after and before. Some of the books that we have loved reading during independent reading across grade 2 have been, I wanna Iguana, The Book With No Pictures, the Giving Tree and The Selfish Crocodile.

In Writing, students have been trying to persuade their audience to give them something. We have been using inspirations from persuasive texts such as The Big Bed, I Wanna New Room, I Wanna Iguana and I am Absolutely Too Small For School. In these books the main character tries to persuade the audience that they want or need something and therefore the grade 2s wrote some amazing letters to try to convince their parents to have a pet.

This term, the Year 3 students have shown amazing resilience and perseverance as they completed their very first NAPLAN assessments! All students rose to the challenge and they should be very proud of their efforts! We congratulate all Year 3 students on a successful NAPLAN period.

In addition, the students continued to amaze us with their curiosity, creativity and their genuine love of learning! Here are some of the things we have been learning about:

Literacy - This term students explored and analysed persuasive texts, reading a range of picture story books and learning about all the fun ways language can be used to persuade an audience. Students had particular fun creating their own sentences using 'hyperbole.' The Year 3's also used the text 'The Day The Crayons Quit' as inspiration to write their own persuasive texts about a classroom object that decided to quit the classroom! From pencils to lunchboxes, the students' creativity was definitely on show!

In humanities, the Year 3s have been learning about the 3 levels of Government in Australia and specifically focused on our Local government, Melton City Council. We looked at the roles and responsibilities of Melton Council, and looked for some of the services provided by the Melton Council, such as our library, local gardens and parks, and our Leisure Centre.







As we wrap up Term 1, it's exciting to reflect on all of the fun and engaging learning experiences we've had. One of the highlights was our hands-on exploration of 3D shapes using icy pole sticks. This activity allowed us to bring geometry to life, where students worked together to create various shapes.

In literacy, we focused on persuasive writing where students had the opportunity to write persuasive letters to Miss Suzi. This was a great way for students to practice structuring their ideas logically, learning how to present arguments clearly and effectively.

In Humanities, we explored the different groups within our community. Through discussions and activities and our community walk, students gained a deeper understanding of how different groups contribute to our wellbeing. It's been an amazing start to the year, with lots of growth in both knowledge and skills. We look forward to building on this in the coming terms.







What a fantastic start to the year for our Year 5 crew! The teachers are absolutely beaming with pride at all the hard work and enthusiasm on display. A huge shoutout to our amazing students who powered through NAPLAN—yes, it can be a little nerve-wracking, but you all tackled it like champs!

Who knew maths could be this fun? From precisely weighing coconut balls ingredients (19-20g or bust!) to design a Wipeout-style obstacle course using 3D shapes, our Year 5 students are proving that numbers and creativity go hand in hand!

After mastering persuasive writing and persuasive language ( such as hyperbole, rhetorical questions) our young authors are now taking on a new challenge—writing letters to the editor! Who knows? We might have some future journalists in our midst!

Year 5 has also been diving into government and democracy—not just by learning the rules, but by taking action! From drafting petitions to staging their own courtroom drama, they're showing us what it really means to have a voice.

On Tuesday the 1st of April, the Mayor of Melton and his colleagues came to visit the Year 6's as part of our Government and Democracy unit. Steve Abboushi provided insight on his roles and responsibilities as the Mayor of the Melton City Council. The students were able to display their knowledge that they had learnt throughout the unit and had the opportunity express their concerns about Caroline Springs and suggestions to improve them.

Next term the Year 6's will be participating in their first Interschool Sports as a cohort. Students got to choose to be a part of the football, soccer, netball, t-ball or hockey team and have been practising daily during their break times as well as during their designated training sessions throughout the week.



The Year 7's have quickly adjusted to life in Secondary School, classes are focused and students are working hard to stay organised and meet those deadlines for CAT's that are quickly approaching.

Well done to the student for sitting NAPLAN during weeks 7 & 8, while this can be daunting they did an amazing job and showed some great resilience

In Science this term, students have had the new experience of spending some time in the science lab, including obtaining a bunsen burner licence .They have had the opportunity to complete some practical lessons, and had lots of fun learning to use a microscope to look at different invertebrates such as snails and worms.







The Year 8 students visited the Organ Pipes National Park during Week 5 as part of their Geology unit in Science. Located just a short drive from Melbourne, the park offers a unique opportunity to observe the iconic basalt columns, known as the Organ Pipes, which were formed through the cooling and cracking of volcanic lava. While exploring the park, students had the chance to see various types of rocks they've been studying in class.

The rocks in the park were formed along the Keilor River gorge. Along their journey, students also encountered several famous rock formations, including the Rosette Stone. The park provided an excellent setting for studying both geography and geological processes, with its impressive display of sedimentary rocks, volcanic formations, and local wildlife.



Most of our Year 9 students sat their final NAPLAN tests this term, which was a great relief to many of them. Their conduct throughout this process was commendable and we look forward to seeing how they all went later in the year when the results are released.

Our Year 9 Home Group Challenge is going well, with 9C holding a narrow lead. We only have two more home group challenges left, so there's still a chance for a takeover from a few other classes!

Classes are preparing stalls for the upcoming 'Busking Day', with a charitable spirit being spread and students donating a few dollars, some time, or some items to help raise funds for the Good Friday Appeal. Thank you to all the families who are helping us with this.


Year 5: Darius Mesina from 5B for acceptance, by showing responsibility for doing an action/showing initiative when not asked to do so

# ACTIVE LISTENING & COMMUNICATION PREP PARENT GUIDE

Active listening and communication skills are important for social interaction, emotional development, and academic readiness, forming the foundation for future learning and communication.

#### LISTENING SKILLS



- Model active listening by making eye contact, avoiding interruptions and demonstrating understanding
- Encourage your child to look at the person they are talking to and turn their body towards them
- Encourage your child to take turns when speaking
- Play fun listening games like Simon says and musical statues

Reading together with your child is a great speaking and listening opportunity. Next time you read together, try asking the following questions

- What do you think will happen next?
- Did you enjoy the story? Why?
- What was your favourite part?
- How did the story make you feel?

#### LEARNING TO IDENTIFY AND EXPRESS FEELINGS

This helps children develop the skills they need to manage emotions effectively. Here are some tips to encourage children to use their words to express how they are feeling.

Help your child name their feelings by giving them a label. This allows your child to develop an emotional vocabulary so they can talk about their feelings.

NAME THE FEELING

USING LANGUAGE

TO EXPRESS

THOUGHTS

**& FEELINGS** 

IDENTIFY FEELINGS IN OTHERS You may ask your child to reflect on how someone else may be feeling. This helps children recognise people's feelings through body language and facial expression.

Show your child how you are feeling in different situations and how you deal with those feelings.

BE A ROLE MODEL

#### ENCOURAGE WITH PRAISE

Praise your child when they talk about their feelings and express them in an appropriate way.

# ACTIVE LISTENING & COMMUNICATION YEARS 1-5 PARENT GUIDE

In Years I – 5, students learn how language allows people to interact effectively and helps to build and maintain relationships.

They also practise active listening and speaking, in order to express and exchange knowledge, skills, attitudes, feelings and opinions.

Below are some ideas to help your child develop effective communication skills:

Encourage your child to express their opinion on the texts they read using statements such as:

BEFORE, DURING AND AFTER READING



- I think ...
- I prefer ...
- I believe ...
- I agree ...
- I disagree ...
- Prompt your child to justify [provide reasons] for their opinions.

Allocate time each day to play a board game or card game that develops the skills of active listening, questioning and responding, for example, Taboo, Simon Says, Would You Rather or Guess Who?

SPEAKING AND LISTENING GAMES

#### FOLLOWING INSTRUCTIONS



Find some time to complete a simple craft or cooking activity that requires your child to follow a series of verbal instructions, for example, making fruit kebabs or creating a paper flower.

After the activity, ask your child to provide the instructions in order for someone else to follow along and complete the task.

Encourage your child to sing songs, recite poetry and perform plays in front of a small audience of family and friends. Prompt your child to take on the role of a book character and perform using a different tone of voice. Reader's Theatre activities are particularly useful and provide lots of fun for the whole family!



# ACTIVE LISTENING & COMMUNICATION YEARS 6-9 PARENT GUIDE

Students in Year 6-9 are in the preparation stages of their persuasive presentation assessments.

These tasks require students to really listen to each other and consider a new perspective and opinion.

To practise these listening skills, you might like to try out these questions at home

- Tell me about the other people in your class. What do they seem to care about?
- What are some of the topics that you have been reading/listening to/watching in English? (All of the classes have been reading and analysing persuasive articles, TED talks or podcasts)
- What is your opinion on those topics?
- When discussing something that you have watched or heard about: What do you think? What might one of your friends think? (Use their friend's name, if you know it!)

Encouraging your child to reflect on what they have heard at school can prompt them to listen more carefully to the contribution of others and help to turn the conversation away from their own opinions, towards the contributions of others.

As a bonus, it also nurtures their understanding of the value that you place on their experiences and their observations of their world around them.


