

We explored supporting language in this space through encouraging children to express ideas and words as they share information about their book, the costume and/or the character. Each room participated in different activities as per their class interests that are closely linked to celebrating book week for 2025! Using intentional play helps to explore and support a love of learning and early exploration of the excitement and magic of literacy.

At Creekside, the children celebrated National Pyjama Day, which brought fun and laughter to the classroom. They wore their comfiest pyjamas and brought their favourite soft toys to participate in the event. We want to extend our gratitude to the families who contributed to the success of this event on many different levels. Together, we raised \$128 for the Pyjama Foundation to support children in foster care.

We celebrated Father's Day, a special occasion dedicated to all dads, grandads, uncles, brothers, mums, grandmas, aunties or to another special person in the child's life. The children diligently worked to prepare gifts for Father's Day and to practice songs to perform for their special person. Educators and children collaborated to create a heartfelt PowerPoint presentation, where they shared their fathers' favourite foods and guessed their ages. The 3-year-old classes have quite enjoyed a range of music and movement. This includes free style dancing, structured directed dances and singing. We have combined a range of music requests from children and common nursery rhymes fostering coordination, balance, memory and language.













4 YEAR OLD KINDER

(Turtle, Snake & Frog Group)

Children in the Turtle group took part in making Banana pancakes. All the children participated in stirring the mixture and mashing up bananas. Cooking is an important and enriching activity for kindergarten children because it supports their development in many meaningful ways. Through hands-on experiences like mixing, measuring, and pouring, children build fine motor skills and early math concepts such as counting, volume, and comparison. Learning through cooking introduces new vocabulary and encourages language development as children follow instructions and describe what they see, smell, and taste. It promotes healthy eating habits by making children more open to trying new foods they helped prepare.

As part of the Pyjama day celebration, the children enjoyed breakfast together at kindergarten. There were lots of yummy choices to make, the children had toast, Rice Bubbles, and Weet-Bix for breakfast. Pyjama Day was so much fun, the children seemed to enjoy participating in this fun opportunity and learning about caring for others.

This term, our four-year-old kinder children participated in the school transition program by attending both Visual Art and PE classes. In the Visual Art class, the teacher introduced different types of art and various techniques for creating artwork. The children observed the differences between a regular prep class and the Visual Art class, as well as the diverse pieces created by other classrooms. They then explored drawing lines, colouring within the lines, and using different colours for each section. In PE, the children visited the gym and enjoyed playing a variety of games with the PE teachers. These activities helped them develop their gross motor skills while also practising important skills such as following instructions, waiting for the whistle, and taking turns.











PREP

Reading

In Reading this term, we have learnt how to use two new comprehension strategies- visualising and summarising. We learnt how to visualise when listening to a story by closing our eyes, and imagining what is happening in our minds. To help us create a vivid mental image, we have explored and unpacked lots of descriptive vocabulary using our 5 senses. We have also learnt how to summarise. We have used StoryChamps icons to help us retell the characters, settings and summarise the problem and solution. Students are still participating in daily phonics to support their reading and writing. To support your child at home, please read with them every night and practise writing high frequency words.

Writing

In Writing this term we have started to write our own narratives! We have included characters, a setting, a problem and a solution. We have been experimenting with using adjectives to make our writing more interesting.




Humanities

In Humanities this term we have been learning about toys and all the different mechanisms that make toys work e.g. push, pull, spin, slide, bounce and float. Students are developing a design brief for a vehicle they would like to build in Week 9. They have loved developing their technology skills by learning the parts of a laptop and logging on themselves and navigating to




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


Health

In Health this term, students have been engaged in discussions around gender roles and family dynamics. Students have also been learning about gender stereotypes and likes and dislikes between people of the same genders. They have also loved learning about friendly and fair play and using these skills to assist with problem solving out in the yard and community.

In reading this term, we have been learning about summarising. We summarised what we read using the 5 W's- Who, When, Where, What and Why. We also used the story champs symbols. Each picture represents a different part of the story to help you summarise what happened. We also used the story champs symbols in writing, to help write our Narratives. We worked really hard to plan and develop a character, setting, problem and solution. We added adjectives and explored using similes to make our stories exciting. We can't wait to read our stories to our family and friends.







In maths we have been learning about money.

We have been identifying the difference between dollars and cents, and learning about the features of each of the Australian coins. Did you know that all of our coins have an Australian animal on them, except for the two dollar coin. We have also been learning about the value of each coin. We learned that one dollar is made up of 100 cents.

In Humanities, we have been creating an invention to solve a problem. We were given four scenarios and had to choose one to create an invention for. The scenarios included, inventing something to:


- 1- Reach things up high

- 4- See in the dark


We were very creative and planned some amazing inventions. We then used our plans to make a model of our invention out of clay and different craft materials. It was so much fun!



The year 2s have had a very exciting end to their term!

For writing, we have been focusing on writing information reports on Australian animals using the writing process of planning, drafting, editing and publishing. We have learnt how to research using different types of resources such as books, online books and Britannica Kids. We wrote down notes on a lotus diagram and are now using the information to create different headings that we will use in our published books.





For Humanities, we have been looking at Geography, in particular about the different states and cities around Australia. To help us better understand Melbourne and its landmarks, we went on an excursion to the city! We went to the MCG, Shrine of Remembrance and the Birrarung Marr playground. We also saw the statue for Weary Dunlop, who one of our school houses is named after and an Australian that we learnt about in term 1. It was an extremely fun day!












In Reading, we have been using reading comprehension strategies to explore our topic 'The Ocean Zones'. The strategies we have used include: questioning, connecting, clarifying and summarising.

We have been learning how to measure the mass of objects. Mass is how much an object weighs, we have been estimating objects around the classroom. Then we weighed the objects and used the formal unit of either grams or kilograms. We even had a go at converting units of mass. On Monday the 8th of September we went to Sea Life Aquarium. We learnt so much about the biome known as the ocean and all the magnificent creatures that live there. We have been learning about the ocean and other biomes and we're currently creating our own nonfiction texts about a chosen zone of the ocean. We can't wait to show these at the celebration of learning.



On Friday 29th August, the Year 4 students set off by bus to the Werribee Open Range Zoo for an exciting day of discovery. Although the weather challenged us, it didn't dampen our spirits. Students learnt about African biomes and the important roles of prey and predators in the wild. A highlight of the day was boarding the safari bus, where we had the chance to see animals such as giraffes, zebras, rhinos and hippos resting in their habitats. We also explored the brand-new elephant enclosure, which was a wonderful experience for everyone. It was a day filled with learning, adventure and lots of memorable moments!











This term, our students have been diving deep into narrative writing. Inspired by the works of Margaret Wild, they are learning how powerful themes and morals can be expressed not only through words, but also through illustrations. Students have been exploring how pictures tell stories, create mood and highlight important lessons just like in Wild's picture storybooks.

In addition, students are bringing their creativity into the world of natural disasters. They are researching events such as earthquakes, tornadoes, tsunamis and volcanoes, and using this knowledge to craft explanation texts and writing about a specific disaster from around the world. Decimals, fractions and percentages dominated the maths unit with success seen all over the year 5 classes!














On Thursday the 4th of September the Year 6s participated in a Billy Cart Incursion for our Design Tech unit for Humanities.

The students rotated through three different stations where they got to build a small Billy Cart, put together the seat component of the Billy Cart as a team and also race Billy Carts against each other. At the end of the session, three student designs of the Billy Carts were chosen to race each other to see which one went the furthest.

This incursion was a great way for the students to apply their design knowledge, use trial and error and develop their collaboration skills.









Maths

This semester, Year 7 explored statistics by recording and presenting data using graphs, plots, and frequency tables, as well as learning to use Excel. They then moved into probability, focusing on correct terminology and writing probabilities as fractions, decimals, and percentages. The current topic is algebra – a new area for most students. They have enjoyed learning how to simplify expressions and solve equations, while making connections to prior knowledge such as BIDMAS and negative numbers.

French

The Year 7's have been learning how to use physical descriptions: saying someone's hair colour, texture, and length, as well as their eye colour. They have also been learning how to describe an outfit. Students are acquiring vocabulary about clothes and accessories, and they are starting to discover the French rules of adjective agreement.





Year 8 Science Gets Hands On with Rat and Heart Dissections!

Last week, our Year 8 students got a chance to roll up their sleeves and explore the amazing world of anatomy through some hands on science with rat and heart dissections. Students carefully examined preserved rats, discovering all the major organs and seeing how different body systems like digestion and circulation work together. It was a real eye opener to see what is inside a mammal and how similar it is to our own bodies.

The highlight for many was the heart dissection, where students got up close with an actual animal heart. They identified the chambers, valves, and blood vessels, learning exactly how the heart keeps blood pumping through the body. It was interesting to see something we usually only read about in textbooks come to life.

Throughout the activity, everyone showed great respect and curiosity, asking plenty of questions and showing off their new scientific drawing skills.

Big thanks to all the students for their enthusiasm and focus during this hands on experience. It was a fantastic way to bring biology to life and get a better understanding of what makes living things tick.





The Year 9 cohort have certainly had a busy term, packing as much into the short 9 weeks as they can. After the Careers Week wrapped up, students continued with their studies and new electives for Semester Two. In English class, students have been studying the text "Living on Hope Street" and were lucky enough to have the author Demet Divaroren come out to do an author talk. Students asked great questions and got a deeper understanding of how the book was created and some of the thinking behind the characters.

The Year 9 Visual Art elective, alongside a small group of Year 4 -6 students, started work on two murals in the primary school area this week. They have been working with visiting artist, Candela Alconada, to plan and create 2 murals that represent the 5 learning powers here at Creekside which are curiosity, open-mindedness, resilience, collaboration and self regulation. We're looking forward to seeing how the murals unfold over the coming weeks.

Finally, all PE classes have been doing some peer-coaching with Grade 2, 3 and 4 classes. This has been a hugely positive experience, where our Year 9s have experimented with their own leadership styles and skills. It's been great to see students stepping up and working with their younger Creekside counterparts.

Next term will be our Year 9 students' final term at Creekside College, which is bittersweet. We look forward to the last 11 weeks, which are full of final learning, exams, Lakeview transition, graduation and end of year activities!


Mathletics

Students from Prep to Grade 6 at Creekside use Mathletics as part of their mathematics program at school. Mathletics is a targeted, rewarding and captivating online learning resource, which is aligned to Victorian curriculum standards. Your child has home access to Mathletics – they simply sign in either with their Mathletics username and password or scan their Mathletics QR code to log in to their profile. They can do this with any compatible computer or mobile device. Please ask your child's classroom teacher if they do not have their login details.

Some of our students have tasks set by their teachers that they are required to work through for homework. When set tasks are completed students are encouraged to complete the **Activities** as shown in the image below. These activities align with your child's individual learning journey. The activities are listed under different topic specific headings.


The extra Mathletics practice at home allows for revision and consolidation of vital skills and concepts covered in class time. Research says that regular revision of concepts covered at school supports the embedding of these skills and concepts into long term memory. The repetition of number fact fluency practice in activities on **Live Mathletics** is extremely beneficial for number fluency.



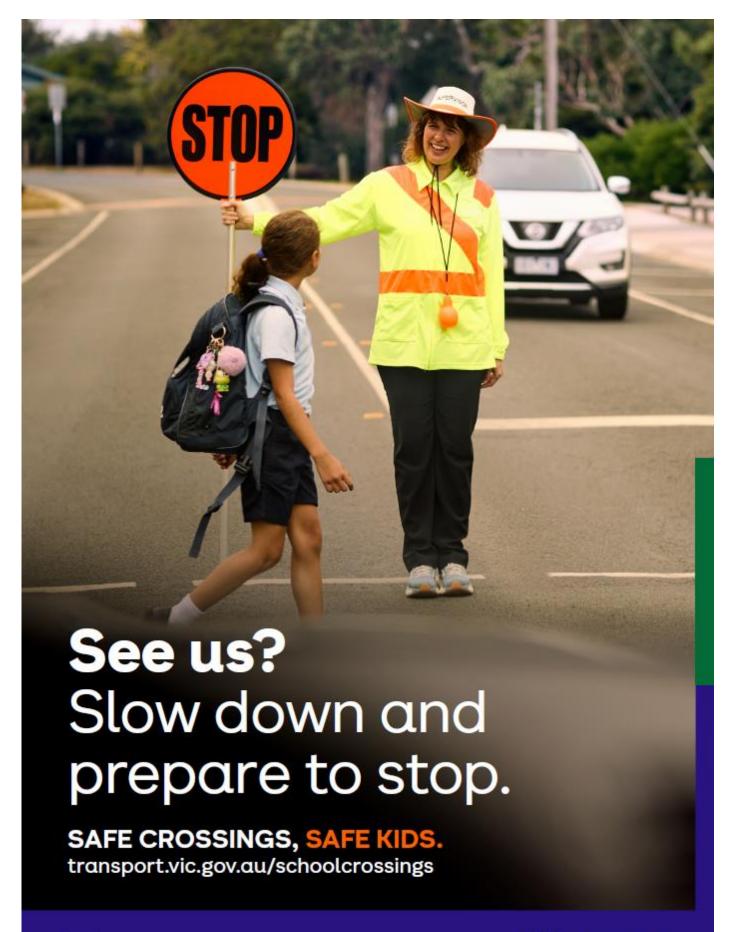
