

Our Blue Edge program for some of our Year 7–9 students is also wrapping up, culminating in an exciting day camp. A few weeks ago, we held a Community Day where students in the program had the opportunity to hear from local Caroline Springs Police officers, as well as Federal, State, and Local Members of Parliament. They shared insights into exciting projects happening in our community and also asked our students for their input on what they'd like to see in the future—a truly empowering experience.

Unfortunately, online behaviour continues to be a challenge many young people face. Cyberbullying is a serious issue, and we want to share some helpful advice from the eSafety Commissioner to support families at home:

Cyberbullying occurs when someone is intentionally mean to a child or young person online, causing them to feel upset, hurt, or unsafe. It can include online hate, trolling, harassment, and threats.

Key points for parents and carers:

- If your child is experiencing online bullying, it can be tempting to take away their device—but this might isolate them further. Consider these options instead.
- Having the support of at least one trusted adult can make a big difference in how a child copes.

#### Help your child by:

- Listening to them without judgment
- Collecting evidence (e.g., screenshots)
- Reporting the abuse to the relevant app, game, or platform
- Seeking help from services such as Kids Helpline
- If the issue is severe and platforms are not responding, eSafety can help remove harmful content and provide further support.

#### K-2: Michelle Lowry



To finish off the term and celebrate all the hard work, we have a range of activities and excursions organised for our students. I hope these days are a fun and enjoyable way to round off the term. We will also be recognising NAIDOC Week, with a number of activities running at break times and in the classroom.

I thank the students, families and staff of the 7-9 sub-school community for making my role so rewarding, as well as the leadership team all the support. I look forward to my return and seeing the growth made by our wonderful students.

## 3 YEAR OLD KINDER

(Duck, Fish & Yabby group)

Children at the age of three have been exploring their surroundings by playing group games, which have helped them develop their large and small muscle skills. These games involve taking turns and playing together. By participating in these games, children are learning to share toys and other items with their friends. This has also improved their ability to interact with others and handle their emotions. During group storytelling, children discuss how sharing can make play more fun for everyone.

In the Fish group, children have been learning about common shapes such as circles, squares, rectangles, and triangles through hands-on activities. These activities include tracing, painting with shape stamps, listening to songs and stories on the interactive whiteboard, and drawing shapes. They have also started to recognize shapes in their environment, like the round shape of a ball or the rectangular shape of a door. The children have realized that these four basic shapes can be found everywhere.

The Duck group has been focusing on improving their fine motor skills. In these photos, you can see them using scissors in playdough, building with small blocks, and playing with letter magnets. We have also been discussing social concepts through books and conversations.

The children in the Yabby group were busy learning about caterpillars through an inquiry project. They started by playing with playdough and rolling it into small balls. Then, they used different art materials and techniques to create caterpillars and butterflies. We also read stories and played puzzles to learn about the life cycle of butterflies.











## 4 YEAR OLD KINDER

(Turtle, Snake & Frog Group)

Body Safety Workshop: Through this interactive workshop, the children learned that their body belongs to them and how to keep it safe. The program was delivered in a gentle, interactive, and fun way, using puppets, stories, songs, and role-playing to reinforce learning. It was child-friendly and used language and concepts that are easy for children to understand. The goal was to give children confidence, awareness, and strategies to keep themselves safe. Children learned how to identify adults they can trust and talk to if they feel unsafe or unsure. They practiced saying "no," "stop," or "I don't like that" using a strong voice. The program taught children to respect others' boundaries and personal space, promoting empathy and mutual respect. Children learned to recognise different emotions and how their body feels when something is not right, such as butterflies in the stomach or feeling scared or uncomfortable.

For four years, our kindergarten has participated in the Hey Dee Ho music program. where children explore storytelling through music, drama, and movement. The sessions focused around the book The Chalk Rainbow. The book was used to encourage children to express their creativity, promote inclusion, and develop emotional awareness. Children were invited to connect with the story through various creative activities. They drew pictures inspired by the chalk rainbow, allowing them to visually interpret the story. Auslan (Australian Sign Language) was introduced and used throughout, helping children learn and practice simple signs. This not only promoted inclusive communication but also fostered an understanding and respect for different forms of expression. The storytelling was interactive and engaging, incorporating music and movement.











## **PREP**

This term the Caroline Springs Fire Department visited our Prep students twice to learn more about fire safety and what emergency services do in our community. The fire fighters shared with us what to do in an emergency - call zero, zero, zero. Students learned to "Get down low and GO, GO GO" in the event of a fire. They also discussed where their family's safe meeting place was outside of their homes.

We have had an amazing term of learning with lots of hard work and fun! A highlight of our weekly Library lessons is reading with our Year 6 buddy class. Wishing all families a restful break and looking forward to another big semester of learning ahead.













In Reading, we have been learning about making predictions. Students have been exploring a variety of fiction and nonfiction books and practising how to make predictions before, during, and after reading. They've been doing a fantastic job applying this strategy during independent reading sessions, writing down their predictions before reading, then reflecting afterwards to see if their predictions were accurate or how their thinking has changed. It's been wonderful to see their confidence and comprehension skills grow through this process!







In Maths, we have been learning about number patterns and exploring new skip counting strategies. Students have been practising skip counting by 2s, 5s, and 10s, and applying this in fun, hands-on activities like creating a skip-counting caterpillar! They've also been using helpful maths tools such as a hundreds chart and MAB blocks to recognise and understand recurring number patterns. It's been exciting to see their confidence grow as they spot patterns and make connections in numbers.

In Writing, students have been learning about sentence structure and how each sentence should include one main idea. We've also been working on making our sentences more interesting and descriptive by adding adjectives. To help build our vocabulary, we spent a whole week exploring our five senses, sight, sound, touch, smell, and taste to come up with descriptive words.

- For sight, students looked at unusual items like a dirty gumboot, a lamp, and a kaleidoscope, describing what they saw and the colours.
- For sound, they listened to different video clips and described how the sounds made them feel.
- For touch, students compared textures, like a hard rock versus a squishy banana and used adjectives to describe each one.
- For smell, they had fun (and sometimes funny!) time smelling a variety of scents, some pleasant, others not so much—and brainstorming words to describe them.
- For taste, students sampled different foods sweet, sour, and savoury and explored how each one tasted differently.

They then applied all of these rich adjectives into their sentence writing. It's been a fun and sensory filled way to grow their vocabulary and improve their writing!





On 19th May 2025, Year 2 students had an unforgettable time at the Sunnystones Camp. It was a fun bus trip. Campers participated in a range of exciting activities such as bush art, bouldering wall and Dreamweaver, low ropes and geocaching. The students had the opportunity to work in different groups outside their classroom setting and formed new friendship groups. The excursion was not only educational but also incredibly inspiring. The students were not only engaged in a variety of enriching activities but also experienced the dining area to enjoy their lunch. Sunlight streamed through the gaps in the wooden rafters, illuminating a long picnic table filled with excited campers. It was so much fun. Year 2's had an amazing time at Sunnystones Day Camp!









For the last two weeks our Year 2 students have been whipping up some delicious and fun recipes as a part of their procedure writing unit. This hands-on activity allowed them to learn about measurement, ingredients, and following instructions in a tasty way. They made rum balls, wombat stews and tiny teddies racing cars. It was wonderful to see their excitement as they mixed, measured, and created their own treats. Not only did they learn valuable skills, but they also enjoyed the process of cooking together and writing their recipes following the correct procedure writing structure. Ask your child to share their favourite recipe and maybe even try making it at home!

#### Puzzlemania Incursion

On June the 13th, the Grade 3s participated in a PuzzleMania Incursion. The students completed a range of challenging puzzles where they had to use problem solving strategies, embrace making mistakes and show persistence.









#### Author Visit - Maxine Beneba Clarke

This term, the Year 3 students were enthralled by local author Maxine Beneba Clarke, who shared her journey from young writer to published poet and novelist. Maxine provided tips and tricks on how to harness your ideas in order to create fun and engaging stories! She encouraged students to explore all genres of writing, from picture story books to comic books, and inspired them to find their 'inner voice' as young writers. Maxine also prompted students to channel their creativity, and explore different art mediums, including collage and painting. We hope to see a few budding authors in the near future!



It's been a wonderfully creative term in Year 4!! Students created horror books inspired by the Goosebumps series. They then put on their research hats and created magnificent information reports about prehistoric animals. In math, students learnt about the different types of angles!







On the 30th of June, we travelled to the Melbourne Museum. They were so excited to see all the wonderful exhibitions and learn all about Australian history in the First People's Gallery. Students were also thrilled to see all the bugs that had been preserved in the 'Bug's Alive exhibition' not to mention all the prehistoric animals that they had learnt about in the non fiction reading and writing unit this term. Lastly the students got to see Melbourne in its early stages and watch it evolve over the years in the Melbourne Story exhibition.





On the 3rd of June 2025, the Creekside College Year 5 students and educators had the opportunity to experience how life was during the Gold Rush. All of these amazing things occurred at Sovereign Hill, Ballarat. The educators booked this wonderful excursion so the Year 5 students could experience and explore deeper into the harsh times of the 1850s.

Majority of the Year 5 students discovered a very little amount of gold, and few found a vast amount. If you ended up finding gold, you would have to tiptoe up a steep hill, and purchase a miniature canister for \$1 and the merchants would place the specks of gold into the canister.

The Year 5s attended an education centre, where a lovely lady would treat the children like they were in the 1850s. They also learnt a vast amount of information. For example, they learnt that women weren't allowed to show their ankles because it supposedly attracts men. This is Chelsea Caruana - Smith's reaction, "It was SO interesting, it answered ALL of my questions." Everyone seemed to enjoy this section of the journey. Towards the end, volunteers got to stand up in front of the class, and share facts about a famous person from the 1850s.

Then, the Year 5s trotted towards mainstreet, there, they encountered the ancient stores such as the candy shop, bakery and a lovely post office. They even got to witness the real horse and carriage trot by.

The last stop for the day was the gold pouring demonstration. Seeing the gold melted down, poured into a gold block was amazing. Aidan Kuci was picked from the crowd to hold the gold worth \$520,000. "I'm never washing my hands again, " - Aidan Kuci 5B









On Tuesday the 3rd of June the year 6's had the opportunity to visit the Melbourne Museum as a part of their Science unit on Extreme weather events. The students were treated to a movie in the gigantic IMAX theatre which explored a range of extreme weather events such as Bushfires, cyclones and calving (when ice glaciers break apart). The movie delved into the cause and effect of these devastating events and was a great opportunity for the students to see these occurrences up close.

Afterwards, the students were asked to put their investigative skills to the test as they collaborated in small groups to examine certain exhibits around the museum and answer questions based on their findings. The exhibits gave the students a new perspective on how the Earth has evolved over time. The dinosaur exhibit included large life-like skeletons as well as interactive displays that gave the students an insight to what life was like 60 million years ago.

The students also went on a rainforest walk journey where they experienced the sights and sounds that replicated the real thing. Some of the animals on display were birds, turtles and lizards. There were also many insects that our students were able to spot despite their best efforts to camouflage.





Term 2 has been a long one with the end drawing close. The end of term has seen our Year 7's sit their first lot of exams, which can be a nerve racking time for some. Well done! Students spent time in class revising term 1 and 2 content to prepare for exams. It is a great time for students to work on building their study habits, as this becomes an important part of their senior secondary schooling.

In Humanities this term students explored the history of Ancient Greece and Ancient China, students looked at the story of Hercules and the structure of Athenian and Spartan society. They also explored the story of The Great Yu, Chinese Dynasties, the Great Wall of China and Qin Shi Huang.

Term 2 interschool sports took place in week 10, with teams competing in Soccer, Netball and Badminton. Well done to our girls Netball team who won the division making it through to regionals. The competition was extremely competitive and despite their best effort, they didn't progress.



Writing is Communication! Support Your Child's Writing at Home 🔬

Writing is more than putting words on a page—it's a powerful way for children to express their thoughts, feelings, and ideas! Here are some ideas to encourage and support functional writing skills at home:



Use a bulletin board or whiteboard in a central area run by the kids



Increase the stakes of the family group chat: throw a prompt in for the family to discuss at the end of the week



Writing their own lunch orders



Rotating "family scribes" responsible for writing birthday cards, updating shopping lists on the fridge and writing reminder notes



Writing letters or postcards to friends and family - no matter the distance!



Inspire the inner critic by creating a book or film review to share with friends and family



Reflecting on our day and ourselves through a diary or journal is a powerful tool for our social and emotional development, so too is it a great way for children to explore writing!

# COMPUTATION SOLVENION

#### What Is Mental Computation?

Mental computation is the ability to perform mathematical calculations in your head without using tools like calculators, pen and paper, or apps. It's about recalling number facts and using simple strategies to find exact or approximate answers quickly.

#### Why Is It Important?

Mental computation is a valuable life skill. It helps children develop:

- Quick Thinking: Estimating costs while shopping or calculating change.
- Problem-Solving: Figuring out how much time is left before a bus arrives.
- Confidence: Handling numbers without always relying on technology.

By practicing mental computation, children build a strong foundation for more complex math skills and become more independent in everyday situations.

At Creekside, mental computation of the addition and subtraction of single digit numbers is a big focus, to allow students to use more of their working memory for problem solving in mathematics.

Here are some strategies you can try at home to support your child with mental computation:

Tens Facts: This concept focuses on a child mastering all the single-digit number pairs that sum to ten (e.g., 4 and 6 make 10). Mastery of these pairs is crucial as it later supports the understanding of larger numbers like 100 and 1000. For example, knowing that 4 + 6 equals 10 helps a student realize that 40 + 60 equals 100.

Doubles: This strategy encourages students to become fluent in adding double numbers, starting with pairs up to 10 + 10, and then progressing to 20 + 20. This method also enhances subtraction skills by creating connections between addition and subtraction. For instance, if a student knows that double 8 is 16, they can easily deduce that 16 - 8 equals 8.

Near Doubles: A strong understanding of doubles is essential for tackling near doubles. These involve adding numbers that are close to being doubles, with an extra one or two added. For example, to solve 6 + 7, a student might recognize that 6 + 6 equals 12 and then add 1 to reach the answer of 13.

Building/Bridging to Ten: This strategy is used when the sum of two numbers exceeds IO. It involves breaking down one number to create a ten and then adding the remainder. For example, in 8 + 4, a student could first calculate 8 + 2, then add the remaining 2 to get I2. This method can also be applied to subtraction and extended to multiples of IO. For example, with 28 + 4, a student would bridge to 30 and then add the leftover 2 to arrive at the final answer.

It is important to note that repeated practise of these strategies will support your child in developing fluency with addition and subtraction.
